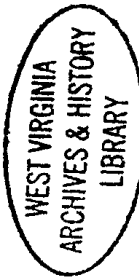

warrant could be approved. The mails at the time being slow and government bureaucracy being even slower, considerable time passed between application and approval. Many frustrated applicants solicited the help of their Congressmen to speed up the process. Proof of marriage was often difficult to obtain because of the loss of public records, particularly in Virginia where fire destroyed courthouses in a number of counties. Affidavits from witnesses to service or marriage were often difficult or impossible to obtain when the applicants were of advanced age or had moved out of state.

There were, of course, fraudulent claims. Some were discovered when the claims were made, while others were found out later. Some people who had been awarded pensions were dropped from the rolls as a result.

Laws for receiving pensions and bounty land were not consistent, since Congress made a number of changes after the first awards were allowed. Consequently, some claimants who were initially rejected were able to submit a successful claim later. However, some who waited too long missed out because of a rules change.

The reader's attention is invited to the many variations in the spelling of names, which was prevalent in those early days. When looking for a particular surname, the reader should also look for similar sounding names; e.g. ALLEN vs. ALLAN, STEWART vs STUART, BRIAN vs BRYAN, NEAL vs NEILL, or CAREY vs CARY.

Variations in ages of the claimants from one court appearance or affidavit to another were prevalent. Not having public records of births in those times, as well as the failing memory of elderly and aged claimants and witnesses, were the main causes of discrepancies.

Some of the microfilmed documents were very difficult to read, especially when the handwriting of the preparers of court documents or family bible entries was poor, or the ink was badly faded or blotched. The compiler of this book often was obliged to make an educated guess as to the names and dates recorded.

An index which lists all people who are not the subject of an entry is provided. Women are listed by both maiden and married names, when known.

This work is a companion piece to the book, WAR OF 1812: VIRGINIA BOUNTY LAND & PENSION APPLICANTS, by the same compiler, published by HERITAGE BOOKS, INC, in 1987.
