On this 29th day of August
1833 personally appeared before me the subscriber a
Justice of the peace in and for the said County
of Lewis, Samuel Stalnaker a resident of Hawk-
ers Creek Settlement in the County of Lewis and
State of Virginia aged 70 years who being first
duly sworn according to law doth on his oath
make the following declaration in order to
obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress paper
dated 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United
States under the following ~~nominal~~ Officers
and served as herein stated. That in the Month
of April in the year 1780 he affiant volunteered
as a private in the County of Monongahela
(now Randolph) Virginia under Capt. James
Bojars as an Indian Spy for 9 months
service, that Adam Stalnaker was Capt.
Bojars Lieutenant and John White his
Ensign, that he was stationed at Westgate
Fork on the Tygart Valley River and placed
upon his spying excursions, that he passed
through the Country, and Counties of (now)
Randolph, Lewis, Harrison, Wood, Tyler &c
on the waters of Tygart Valley, Buckhannon
River, Stone Coal Creek, Hanes Creek, West
fork River, Hugger River, Ten Mile Creek in Virginia
State, that during all these times he affiant
passed on Indian Trails frequently on their
return to their habitations in Ohio State, often
having made excursions and committed thefts
and murder upon the (then) New settlers Country
through which he passed but without ever being
able to get rid of their property.

in the first of his servitude of nine months as a
Volunteer under Capt Cornelius Bogard the
winter of 1780. being an open one and favorable
to the Savage Indians. The Volunteers were not
discharged under Capt Bogard until 1781

Then in March 1781 affiant again volunteered
for 8 months as a private to spy through the
same Counties and Country as above enumerated
namely Randolph &c on the waters of Tygart
Valley &c in Virginia State, under the command
Bogard Lieutenant Adam Stenachus, Ensign
John White, was stationed at Westfall Fort again
on Tygart Valley River, Monongahela County
Virginia engaged upon his Spring expeditions
was actively engaged during throughout that
Summer rescuing stolen property pursuing
Indians & but without affiant or his company
with him ever being able to kill any of the Savages

That he was discharged in November 1781 by Capt Bogard. In April 1782 affiant again
volunteered under Captain Cunningham as a
private to spy through the same Counties of (now)
Randolph &c on the waters of Tygart Valley &c in
Monongahela County Virginia for six months
was again stationed at Westfall Fort on the
Tygart Valley River affiant again entered upon
his Spring excursions and during this servitude
the Indians in one of their hostile visits killed
five of William Scott's family on the Tygart Valley
River. Affiant was one that pursued after the
Savages followed their trail twenty miles, and
entirely lost any further tidings of them, and
returned under Capt Cunningham who was
along personally to Fort. That before the Indians
stole horses out of the settlement. Affiant continued
on his Servitude of six months for which he volunteered

without any other occurrence of particular note
happening since was discharged by his Captain
- Vaughan in October 1782. Then in April 1783
Affiant again volunteered as a private to spy
through the (now) Counties of Lewis, Harrison,
Syle, Woods, &c on Waters of West Fork River
Valley River, Hughes River &c (emptying in Ohio
River) under Captain Shuffler Carpenter, Lieut
James Tammie, Ensign John Brown for four months
was stationed at Fort Lusk on Hackers Creek (now
in Lewis County) in Monongahela County Virginia
affiant entered & vigilantly reported spyings & invasions
towards Ohio River, Remained but one
circumstance of particular note this last ser-
vitude namely the killing of three of his neigh-
bors and making prisoners of three more by the
Indians in July 1783 which prisoners an active
effort has made to save particularly by affiant
Elias and John Herod two of the most renowned
men of their day in defending the frontier and
surprising the enemy who out travelled the rest
of those who pursued but the Indians made
such flight that they could not be overtaken, affiant
continued until August 1783 Spying, at
which time he was discharged by his Captain
Shuffler Carpenter. Affiant was never regularly placed
under any Colonel, but knew Col Lovell and
Col Benjamin Wilson. Affiant has no documented
evidence, and that he knows of no person
whose testimony he can procure who can testify
to his services. He hereby relinquishes every claim
what ever to a pension or annuity except the present
and declares that his name is not on pension Roll
of the Agency of any State

The said Justice of the peace then proceeded
to propound to affiant the seven several interrogatory
questions prescribed by the War Department, to which
he answered as follows viz.

As to the first affiant says he was born in Hampshire
County Virginia in the year 1768.

As to the 2^d Interrogatory, Affiant saith that he hath
not.

As to the 3^d. Affiant saith that he was living in
Monongahela County Virginia: that he has
lived since in Philadelphia, that he now lives in
Lewis County Virginia.

As to the 4th. Affiant saith that he volunteered

As to the 5th. Affiant saith that he knew Capt
Bogard, Cunningham & Carpenter all of
whom he served under Lieutenant ^{Adj't} Statuacher
and James Tamm & Colonels Dorothy & Wilson

As to 6th. Affiant saith that he was regularly
discharged the two first terms by Capt. Dorothy
Bogard, 3^d by Capt. Cunningham, and lastly
by Capt. Carpenter, but has lost or mislaid
them all so that he cant find them.

As to 7th. Affiant saith that he is known to Thos.
Brown and Egbert Powers who can testify
to his character for veracity, and their belief of
his services as a Soldier of the Revolution.

We Thomas Brown and Egbert Powers residents
of Lewis County, one State of Virginia, hereby certi-
fie that we are well acquainted with Samuel
Statuacher who has subscribed us sworn to
the above declaration, that we believe him to be
no less than 70 years of age that he is reported and believed
in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a
soldier of the Revolution and ^{that} our cause on that
opinion. Sworn and subscribed the day and

And the said Justice of the Peace doth here
by declare his opinion after the investigation of
the matter and after putting the interrogatories
prescribed by the War Department, that the
above named applicant was a Revolutionary
soldier and served as he states, and the said
Justice further certifies, that it appears to him
that Thomas Brown and by which Power, who
have signed the preceding certificate are
residents of Lewis County and State of Virginia
and are creditable persons, and their statement
is entitled to credit. And the said Justice
further certifies that there is no Negro man
residing in the Neighborhoods of the above
named applicant. And the said Justice
further certifies that the above named applic-
ant from bodily infirmity is unable to attend
the Court of Justice, County of Lewis from which he
resides 8 miles. And the said Justice further
certifies that the foregoing contains the original
proceedings before him in the matter of the applica-
tion of Samuel Shumacker for a pension.
